Dear Citizens of Sioux Falls:

Each year I try to reflect on the year's accomplishments as I write my annual message to capture what was accomplished by our department. For 2015, I think it is safe to say we had a progressive agenda on multiple fronts including continued progress on the Midco® Aquatic Center, major park system planning projects, fostering public private partnerships, marketing and promotions, and a continued focus on maintaining the quality of our infrastructure.

The Midco® Aquatic Center took great strides as we started construction on our first new indoor aquatic center and followed that up with a \$2.2 M title sponsorship naming rights deal with Midcontinent Communications, now known as Midco.

Another major effort was put toward partnering with the Friends of Levitt Shell Sioux Falls and the Mimi and Mortimer Levitt Foundation to bring 50 free professional musical performances to Falls Park West on an annual basis. As a result of this agreement, Sioux Falls is scheduled to become the ninth city in America with an official Levitt Concert Series Venue.

Major efforts were also undertaken by our staff to achieve re-accreditation by the Commission for Accreditation of Parks and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA), which less than 1 percent of parks and recreation agencies in the nation can claim. This CAPRA seal of approval validates that your parks and recreation department operates using best practices in the parks and recreation industry.

Great effort was also put forward on updating our Comprehensive Parks and Recreation System Master Plan. Through community and stakeholder engagement this plan will guide our efforts well into the future.

Significant time and effort was also spent on our marketing plans, operational readiness for the opening of the Midco® Aquatic Center, and the Stockyards Plaza Lease Agreement—all projects that will move our department forward by helping to better serve the needs of our great city.

The Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation Board is a seven-member board. Each member may serve two five-year terms for a total of ten years of service. Members are appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of the City Council. Officers of the board include the president, vice president, and secretary, who are elected by board members. Meetings are held on the third Tuesday of each month, with a quorum of four board members being necessary for a meeting.

Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation Board is celebrating 100 years of service to the Sioux Falls community. To date, more than 80 board members have shared their time, talent, and expertise with the park system.

Sioux Falls pioneer E.A. Sherman had a vision to allow park boards to be created. That vision became state law in 1915. On June 6, 1915, the City Commission named the first board, with E.A. Sherman, Astor Blauvelt, and Robert Wehling serving on the board. The first meeting of the board occurred on June 29, 1915, and Sherman was appointed president of the board. At that time, the City already had acquired parks such as Lien, Sherman, and McKennan.

During the past 100 years, the Parks and Recreation Board has helped guide the development of our park system to improve the quality of life for our community and visitors.

Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation has evolved through the years. It currently employs 72 full-time staff and more than 400 part-time staff who serve a population of 169,800 citizens and a metropolitan service area of 250,850. More than 3,100 acres of parkland and 500 recreational classes and programs are available for citizens to enjoy. Eighty developed parks are strategically located so that nearly every Sioux Falls resident lives within a half mile of a park. The bike trail system includes a 20-mile loop that never crosses a city street and parallels the Big Sioux River. The City's namesake Falls Park is home to the beautiful falls of the Big Sioux River that are lighted for various occasions throughout the year.

SFPR Achieves Reaccreditation Ranks Among the Best of the Best in the Nation!

Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation was reaccredited in the fall of 2015 by the Commission for Accreditation of Park and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA). Accreditation is valid for a period of five years. The self-assessment requires agencies to provide documented evidence for each of the 151 standards representing best practices of effective and efficient park and recreation operations. To earn national accreditation, agencies must fully meet all 37 fundamental standards and at least 85 percent of the remaining 114 nonfundamental standards. Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation met all fundamental standards and 96 percent of the remaining standards. Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation has been accredited through CAPRA since 2010. CAPRA accreditation is a distinguished mark of excellence for park and recreation agencies and is a measure of an agency's overall quality of operation, management, and service to the community. The National Recreation and Park Association research team estimates that there are approximately 14,000 parks and recreation agencies nationwide, of which 1 percent, or 144, have earned national accreditation.

1. Midco® Aquatic Center Construction
Construction began this year on the city's first indoor aquatic center. The project continues to be under budget and on schedule for a fall 2016 grand opening. The facility is a long-anticipated need for our community and will be one that will make our city and region very proud.



2. Secured Midco® Aquatic Center Naming Rights Agreement
The City of Sioux Falls reached an agreement with Midcontinent Communications® to be the naming rights title sponsor for the indoor aquatic center at Spellerberg Park. Midcontinent will be the exclusive title sponsor and provide customers with free, powerful Wi-Fi service. The sponsorship agreement is for ten years and has a total package value of \$2.2 million.



3. Sioux Falls to Become the Ninth City in America With an Official Levitt Concert Series Venue
Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation facilitated a three-party agreement with Friends of Levitt Shell Sioux Falls and the Mimi and Mortimer National Levitt Foundation to develop the framework under which a Levitt Concert Series will be performed in Sioux Falls. The venue is slated to be built in the new Falls Park West and be operational by 2019.



4. Department Achieves Reaccreditation
Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation has been reaccredited by the Commission for the Accreditation of Parks and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA). Less than 1% of the nation's parks and recreation agencies are accredited by CAPRA. Sioux Falls was first accredited in 2010 and is now reaccredited through 2020. Accreditation involves a rigorous process of providing evidence of compliance with 151 standards considered to be best practices in the parks and recreation industry.



5. Comprehensive Parks and Recreation System Master Plan Completed
Through a series of focus group meetings and with the assistance of our parks and recreation consultant GreenPlay, Inc., we updated our parks and recreation system master plan to provide strategic direction for the growth and development of our parks and recreation system over the next ten years.

6. Five Parks Most in Need Receive Renovations
Five older parks in the Sioux Falls parks system received needed facelifts in 2015. Those parks included Lacey, Bryant, Burnside, Tower, and Beadle. Depending on the park, improvements included new play structures, picnic shelters, basketball courts, pathways, drainage improvements, backstops, fencing, dugouts, and lighting improvements.

7. Great Bear Tubing Hill Renovation
Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation formed a partnership with Great Bear Recreation Park, Inc., to fund improvements to expand the convenience and capacity of the tubing hill. The project nearly tripled the number of tubing lanes, lowered wait times, and increased snowmaking capabilities.

8. Trail System Expanded, Improved, and Made More User Friendly
The bike trail system in Sioux Falls just keeps getting better! This year a new half-mile stretch of bike trail was added along Diamond Creek to provide direct access to the main trail loop for the neighborhoods south of 57th Street, and the trail was extended from Lien Park toward I-229 along the Big Sioux River. Key improvements were also made on the one-mile stretch of bike trail within Yankton Trail Park. The City also installed trail counters at various locations on the main trail loop. From June 8 to December 31, 2015, more than 209,000 pedestrians and 632,000 bikers have been counted. This data will be critical in planning future trail projects.



9. Three New Neighborhood Parks
Three parks were added to the park system to keep up with the growth of Sioux Falls neighborhoods: Southern Vistas at 53rd Street and Klein Avenue, Prairie Hills at Hemingstone Trail and Callington Avenue, and Whispering Woods South at 68th Street and Bahnson Avenue. With the completion of these projects, the City of Sioux Falls now has 80 public parks within its award-winning parks and recreation system.



10. Negotiated Stockyards Plaza Lease Agreement
Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation negotiated a lease agreement with Stockyards Plaza Inc. to repurpose the horse barn in Falls Park to a Stockyards AG Experience Barn to tell the history of the Sioux Falls stockyards and to educate visitors on the farm to table concept.



The City of Sioux Falls Parks and Recreation Department plays a major role in the success of some of the city's best known events.


The department is primarily responsible for facility and park rentals, and assists event organizers in navigating the City's special events application and permitting process.

Vegetation Programs

Nuisance Tree Program—The Forestry Division of Parks and Recreation manages street tree complaints for the City. All tree complaints are investigated and appropriate action is taken to maintain established clearance heights over streets and sidewalks. In 2015, 240 tree inspections were made. This program yielded a 92 percent compliance rate from the community after a notice of violation was delivered.

Urban Forest Surveys—The Forestry Division surveys the city for dead or diseased trees on street right-of-ways and private property. In 2015, private property owners removed 416 dead or diseased trees from their property while 314 trees were removed from public right-of-ways.

Project T.R.I.M. (Tree Raising Improvement Methods) Program—The Forestry Division manages a cyclic program to survey street trees for established clearances over streets and sidewalks. In 2015, 11,293 inspections were made, resulting in 4,675 violations. The final inspection required the services of the Forestry Division to trim 163 properties to meet City code. This proactive program yielded a 97 percent compliance rate from the community after a notice of violation was delivered.

Vegetation Management in Parks—In the spring of 2015, the Forestry Division planted 706 trees and shrubs in 29 different parks and medians. The park system also planted 21,764 annual flowers and 1,092 perennial flowers in various parks.

The Forestry Division continues to inventory park trees and the inventory is approximately 90 percent completed. The inventory helps the Forestry Division manage the tree population in the park system. In 2015 there were 170 different types of trees and tree cultivars in the park system. The park tree inventory stands at 9,093 trees and has an appraised value of \$46,047,650.

2015 Accomplishments

- ◆ Planted 706 trees and shrubs in 29 different parks, along boulevards, along with 21,764 annual flowers and 1,092 perennial flowers in various parks throughout the city.
- ◆ Completed the inspection of 240 properties for tree complaints with city crews bringing 19 of those properties into compliance.
- ◆ Surveyed the city for diseased or dead trees, resulting in the removal of 314 street trees and 416 private trees.
- ◆ Issued 51 permits for the removal of 89 street trees.
- ◆ The Forestry crew removed 129 trees and 299 tree stumps along city streets.
- ◆ The Forestry crew removed and ground stumps of 183 trees in the park system.
- ◆ Administered the licensing program for City arborists, resulting in 44 licenses being issued.



In 2013 all areas of “other city property” were evaluated by the drainage engineer in Public Works and some areas were reclassified to reflect the actual descriptions and use of the properties. Beginning in January 2015 the “other city property team” had 1,928.38 acres of storm drainage, detention ponds, levee’s, lot’s and landscaped boulevards within the city limits of Sioux Falls. The city acquired an additional 28.9 acres of storm drainage & detention ponds and 2.82 acres of lots giving the total acreage of 1,960.10 for maintenance crews to maintain by the end of 2015. The maintenance consists of mowing a 12-foot buffer area once a week around the storm drainage & detention ponds along with noxious weed control throughout the entire parcel. Maintenance crews also maintain all 70-plus acres of landscaped boulevards within the city limits with mowing, plant/shrub/tree care and spraying for noxious weeds.

Falls Overlook Café

Falls Overlook Cafe sits on the east bank of the Big Sioux River in Falls Park, Sioux Falls. Located in a restored 1908 hydro electric plant, the Cafe serves a variety of food and beverages and offers dining inside and outside with a view of the falls. Historic exhibits are displayed inside the building.

The Falls Overlook Café offers a beautiful venue with plenty of space and a variety of catering options. The venue is available for rent during all seasons. It has seating for 100, and capacity for 200, with high-top tables.

The Falls Overlook Café opened in 2005 and is operated under a management agreement between the City of Sioux Falls and Mikrho Management LLC.



Falls Park Visitor Information Center

Falls Park is the ideal location from which to promote the city of Sioux Falls. Management of the Visitor Center is accomplished through an agreement with the Sioux Falls Convention and Visitors Bureau.

The Falls Park Visitor Information Center is located in Downtown Sioux Falls and is attached to the five-story viewing tower in Falls Park.

The Falls Park Visitor Information Center hosted 197,065 visitors in 2015, a 5% increase over 2014 and 14% increase over 2013. Visitors who entered the Visitor Information Center in 2014 totaled 186,456. The number of visitors in 2015 is also a record since it's opening in 2000. The Visitor Information Center is managed by the Sioux Falls Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Visitors have the opportunity to sign an electronic guest book, but the actual count is taken as people enter the building. It is estimated that approximately one-third of the people visiting Falls Park actually enter the Visitor Information Center and/or sign the guest book.

Visitors who signed the guest book in 2015 have come from 50 states and 43 foreign countries.


Tennis Instruction and Leagues

Great Plains Zoo & Delbridge Museum

The Great Plains Zoo & Delbridge Museum of Natural History is owned and operated through a partnership between the City of Sioux Falls and the Zoological Society. The City of Sioux Falls owns the infrastructure, land, and all assets associated with the Zoo and Museum and maintains the grounds in and around the facility. The Zoological Society operates the facility, manages the animal collection, and maintains the grounds within the exhibit. In addition, the Society is a nonprofit organization that serves as a fundraising arm for the facility to help further the mission of the Zoo.

The Lloyd Family and Lloyd Companies, the Sioux Falls-based development, real estate, construction and property management company, in August announced that it will match the Zoo's fundraising efforts for the Brown Bear renovation up to \$250,000. The \$2 million project will begin next year and is expected to be completed in 2017.

In September of 2015, the Great Plains Zoo and Delbridge Museum of Natural History received the Association of Zoos and Aquarium's (AZA) Top Honors Award for Exhibit Design (for the annual operating budgets under \$5 million category) for its Snow Monkey (Japanese Macaque) exhibit.

The zoo is home to over 1,000 animals in 45 parkland acres and is open year-round.

Golf

Phase 2 renovations at Elmwood Golf Course have been completed. The three-year, three-phase renovation of Elmwood Golf Course was made possible by a partnership between the City of Sioux Falls and the Sioux Falls Regional Airport Authority. This partnership included allowing for the airport authority to expand its runway safety area partially onto the existing golf course and to also bring the airport into full compliance with the latest Federal Aviation Administration safety regulations.

Construction on the North Nine kicked off in late September 2014. The improvements included the realigning of four holes, a new par-3 hole no. 15, grading and drainage improvements, concrete cart paths, irrigation, and the regrassing of all the tees, fairways, and greens for consistent playing conditions from hole to hole. Phase 2 of the project also included the renovation of the driving range and construction of three of the five new junior course holes. Phase 3 construction began September 2015, on the West Nine, including the construction of the other half of the new junior course. The entire project is scheduled to be completed in September 2016, when Elmwood will resume normal operations as a 27-hole facility.

The estimated cost of improvements for the Elmwood Golf Course renovation is approximately \$5 million. Sources of funding include the Federal Aviation Administration, Sioux Falls Regional Airport, and the City of Sioux Falls.

Mary Jo Wegner Arboretum

The Society provides year-round activities, including group outings, picnics, site tours, weddings, education classes, and facility rentals at the newly constructed Mabel and Judy Jasper Educational Center.

Sertoma Butterfly House and Marine Cove

Through an agreement with Parks and Recreation, operates this year-round facility at Sertoma Park. Over 800 butterflies from around the world are housed in a 3,600-square-foot tropical conservatory. Hundreds of aquatic animals are displayed in over 10,000 gallons of saltwater and freshwater aquariums. Educational programs and other special events promote interactive learning about butterflies, fish, rain forests, and oceans.

The Outdoor Campus

Parks and Recreation cooperates with the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish & Parks through a joint-use agreement for the operation of an outdoor skill center at Sertoma Park, which opened in June 1997. The center, which is known as The Outdoor Campus, features a 3,000-gallon aquarium; habitat and outdoor activities exhibits; and a wildlife viewing area. The Outdoor Campus also houses the regional offices for the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish & Parks Wildlife Division.


Great Bear Recreation Park

Great Bear Recreation Park completed the Kirby Family Tubing Park renovation. The project included reshaping the tubing hill that now offers 12 tubing lanes, a new faster and safer conveyor system that will move people up the hill more efficiently and decrease wait times, and upgrades to the utilities for improved snowmaking capabilities.

Parks and Recreation (which includes park operations, recreation programming, park development, and administration) has 71 full-time employees. Park Maintenance Headquarters, located on West 49th Street, is where park maintenance, forestry, and central services staff report to work. Light mechanical repairs to equipment, scheduling of specialized maintenance equipment, distribution of supplies, and carpentry work are all functions completed at this location. Forestry crews perform tree trimming and removal throughout the park system, and enforce the street tree ordinance and non-parkland management, including downtown trees, boulevards, and drainage ways. The city is divided into four park districts, each having a district supervisor who is accompanied by park caretakers (assigned as crew leaders) and park service workers who assist with daily maintenance of the neighborhood and community parks located within their district boundary. The Parks and Recreation administration office, at Sixth Street and Phillips Avenue, is the location of park planning, administration, and recreation program personnel.




